# 2016: BEST YEAR EVER FOR PROJECT EFFORT

Congratulations to everyone associated with INSAF for posting by far the highest total of collective project effort in 2016 in INSAF's 44 year operational history. This followed record efforts in the previous two years. This shows our spirit of "giving back" is getting stronger. This incrased outlay was largely fueled by q \$80,354 donation to the Kanchan Foundation (see INSAF newsletter, November 2016) and a push to build a school in earthquake ravaged Nepal. Over 36 INSAF families came together to raise over \$42,000 to help build the school in Selang, a village in the Sindhupalchok district.

The total project effort in 2016 was \$213,670 which is about 75% increase from the \$121,730 in 2014, the highest contribution in any prior year.

Page 5 has our "Project Honor Roll" for 2016. which shows the specific projects. The **number** of projects, which indicates "breadth", was 24 relative to 36 in 2015, a large drop. We need more members to be involved in defining and executing on worthy causes. The **median** amount per project can be taken as an indicator of depth. The median dollars per project in Yr 2016 was 2,000, double the \$1,000 last year.

Of course, each project is unique in how it makes a difference, and numbers only provide a partial perspective. Here are the types of causes our INSAF colleagues chose to support in 2016:

# Generalized Description for Project Goal

- Promotion of literacy and good quality education for poor children
- Care and education for "out-of-system" or otherwise disadvantaged children
- Rebuilding/upgrades of a school each in Punjab, Haryana, and Nepal
- Pre-school education of children from disadvantaged families
- College education of youth from disadvantaged families
- Funding for community services
- Incentivization of students to perform better
- Support for work on women's empowerment
- Community health services

Special congratulations to each of the Project Leaders and Sponsors for their successful effort in implementing the "give back" projects listed on Page 5. # INSAF Project Due Diligence

In 2016, INSAF Board of Directors decided to put a formal structure on the due diligence we have been carrying out. Due diligence is a requirement the United States Internal Revenue Service imposes on non-profits. Due diligence helps us ensure that the INSAF membership contributions are spent in compliance with the INSAF constitution, in keeping with the spirit of the INSAF ideals, and in accordance with the contributors' desires.

INSAF approach is to define three categories of projects each year based on the INSAF support for the project for that year. Category 1 project are projects where INSAF support for the year was \$5,000 or more. Category II are projects where INSAF support for the year was between \$1,000 and \$5,000. Category III are projects where INSAF support for the year was less than \$1,000.

Due diligence requires that we have appropriate receipt for funds for category III projects. For category II projects, in addition to the receipts, we require some communication from the recipient how the funds were spent. For category I projects, in addition to the category II requirements, we require some collateral in the terms of what functions the recipient organization performs and what are its goals and objectives.

In 2016, we conducted due diligence for 2015 projects. Due diligence was led by Dr. Santosh Chokhani. Dr. Chokhani received great deal of assistance from Dr. Bhav Sharma and Ms. Padmashri Lad.

A total of 36 projects were reviewed and their categorical breakdown is as follows: Six category I; thirteen category II; and seventeen category III. We are pleased to report that the effort was successful thanks to you all from whom we sought the information. Only thing we were not able to obtain is how funds were spent for three of the category II projects.

We will again conduct due diligence for 2016 this year. Please provide and be prepared to provide aforementioned information for the projects. We greatly appreciate your efforts and project leadership and wish to thank you in advance for 2016 effort.

# <u>Punjab University Awards "Class of 1969" and "Amrit</u> <u>Kaur" Scholarships</u>

As many of you know INSAF started as Friends of Punjab University Alumni Association (FOPUAA) in an attempt to provide assistance to the Chemical Engineering Department at the University in 1973. Well, we have been at it and now have started a new chapter for INSAF.

INSAF members from the graduating Class of 1969 from the Punjab University Chemical Engineering Department decided to celebrate the 30<sup>th</sup> anniversary of their graduation in 1999 by instituting scholarships totaling Rs. 20,000/year at their alma mater. Subsequently, the group added additional funds and increased the scholarship total amount to Rs. 60,000/year. In 2016, Pritinder Singh Arora, a member of the Class of 1969, added further additional funds for scholarships of Rs. 60,000/yr in honor of his late mother, respected Smt. Amrit J Kaur Ji. This has brought the annual outlay to Rs. 1,20,000.

The scholarships stipulate that the annual family income of an applicant has to be less than Rs. 300,000 per year (about \$4,600). An internal committee at the university awards the scholarships on the basis of merit among the applicants. INSAF is not involved in the application process or the selection process aside from setting the merit-cum means and community service criteria. All of these

scholarships require a modest amount of community service by the recipients.

We are pleased to report that the following 6 students have been awarded scholarships of Rs. 20,000 each for the year 2016-17 on the basis of a merit-cum-means criteria.

# INSAF 2017 BOARD OF DIRECTORS ELECTION

INSAF is very fortunate to have a dedicated and experienced team of volunteers who have agreed to service on the INSAF Board for the next 2-year-term which began Feb 1. A warm welcome to Mrs. Padma Cariappa, who along with her husband Arun Cariappa, has been a Life Member for about 11 years, and has been personally active consistently in the Pratham Mysore project apart from being a financial contributor. Brief biographies for the team are at the end of this newsletter.

# Kaliuva Mane Project – A Success Story that Continues to Grow

Kaliuva Mane, located on the outskirts of Mysore, is a unique educational institution run by The Divya Deepa Trust. Kaliuva Mane, which means a house of learning in Kannada, was established by M.R. Ananth Kumar with the goal of providing a good basic education to poor rural kids coming from illiterate, and often broken, families. These are kids who have either never attended school, or attended for a year or two and dropped out for various reasons - most commonly owing to family pressure to earn a living by working in the fields. In Kaliuva Mane's vision most of the kids entering Kaliuva Mane should be able to complete SSLC (the X grade public examination administered by Karnataka State). After completing SSLC, the children have several choices. The smartest and the most dedicated go on to college to enroll in P.U.C. A large fraction of those matriculating will enroll in vocational training courses such as ITI, which provide excellent employment opportunities in a variety of technical areas. A smaller number will enter college with the goal of pursuing B.A., B.Sc., B.Com. or even Engineering and Medicine. Some may seek employment directly after SSLC. No matter what career path they choose, all would have immeasurably improved their future prospects and would be well on their way to becoming constructive citizens instead of becoming deadbeat burdens to society. It is not at all a utopian vision, but a highly pragmatic one, as evidenced by the many success stories of Kaliuva Mane graduates. The impact of Kaliuva Mane on the poor children of surrounding villages has been transformative.

Starting from a very humble background, Kaliuva Mane has grown significantly in the past five years. Presently Kaliyuva Mane caters to over 130 children. Approximately 30% of the children are provided room and board and the remaining 70% are day scholars. More details on Kaliuva Mane can be found at: http://www.divyadeepatrust.org/. INSAF has played a substantial role in the success and growth of Kaliuva Mane. We have been providing Kaliuva Mane significant support for almost ten years to help them meet their operational costs. INSAF support has increased to about \$20,000/year for the past three years, in keeping with the growth of Kaliuva Mane and rising operational costs. We intend to continue providing this support.

The Kaliuva Mane Board of Trustees has recently decided to transition Kaliuva Mane to a fully residential school. The present infrastructure can accommodate 40 resident children; about 30 boys and 10 girls. To meet the new objectives, major Infrastructure Improvements are needed including, additional dormitories and new kitchen and dining facilities.

Two INSAF board members, P. Harshavardhana and Joginder Kundra, have been working closely with Kaliuva Mane management to determine a robust, cost-effective, phased approach for infrastructure construction. After evaluating several architectural proposals, a two phase approach spread over three years, 2017, 2018 and 2019, has been selected.

Phase 1 entails expanding a currently existing singlestory structure to a bi-level facility. Modifications required would include a new RCC roof over the ground floor, adding a second level, with stairway, additional bathrooms and toilet facilities. Once completed, the new building will accommodate 10 staff members and 36 students. Estimated cost of this modification is about Rs 45 lakhs = \$70,000. The contract is expected to be awarded in 4-6 weeks and completion of Phase-1 is expected by the end of this year.

Phase 2 entails demolishing the existing kitchen and the attached structure (this building is old and unsuitable for long term use). The plan is to construct a new two story building accommodating a kitchen, storage room and dining facilities at the ground level. The second level will accommodate about 36 children and two caretakers. Each floor will be about 2,400 SF and structure will be designed so as to support the addition of a third level, if and when needed in the future. The two-level facility is expected to cost about **Rs.** 70 lakhs = \$105,000 and will be completed during 2018-2019.

The Total Cost for Phase-1 and Phase-2, with \$15,000 for contingency, is of the order of \$190,000. INSAF objective is to provide \$40,000 per year for three years for Infrastructure Improvements (over and above the \$20,000/year already being provided for meeting operational costs). With \$20,000/year commitment by Kundra family, additional support of \$20,000/year is needed from other INSAF members. The remaining funds are to be raised by Divya Deepa Trust from domestic donors.

We have pledges from INSAF members for the effort for \$87,000 so far. This gives us a shortfall of \$33,000 total. Of the \$33,000, we would need to raise \$9,000 for 2017 and \$12,000 for each for 2018 and 2019.

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## Update on Nepal School Project

As most of you know, the April 2015 earthquake in Nepal was quite devastating. Over 36 INSAF families came forward to construct a primary school in Selang village area which had lost almost all of its schools in the earthquake. INSAF has been working with Ne:Kalp, an NGO in Nepal to construct a school in Selang (Sindhupalchok district). For furher details, see back issues of INSAF newsletter starting with December 2015.

We are pleased to report that the essential parts of the project have been successfully concluded and we have handed over the fully constructed school building, the drinking water facility, and the toilet facilities. We are further pleased to report that the school is now functioning in the new facilities. . A photo on this page shows a plaque on the side the school building acknowledging the efforts of the local community, Ne:Kalp, and INSAF.

The picture below shows a school classroom. Our thanks to all those who contributed to the project. You should be proud of what you help build and on top of all this it is a great looking school nestled in great venue, the Himalayas. Just imagine the view.



On the side are two looks at the school from outside. The first one is truly breathtaking.

The final phase of the project is some landscaping work. This requires leveling of some ground by bulldozer which could not be available as the area people were caught up in local elections held for the first time in 20 years. After leveling of the ground, the installation of an outer fence and of a school entrance gate will be completed.

Member) is in Politics and started his own company in 2015.


